Dear Contractor:

Applications are now available for Snow Plowing Contractors for the removal of snow on streets and walkways within the Town of North Kingstown for the upcoming winter season. Completed application packages are to be returned to the Highway Division, Department of Public Works, 2050 Davisville Road, North Kingstown, Rhode Island 02852. This packet includes the appropriate forms for completing application process and for billing procedures.

10% Early Sign-Up Incentive:

Properly completed, original, notarized E-Form and all necessary documentation shall be submitted to and received by DPW as described in the enclosed instruction **by 3:30 p.m. on Monday, December 1, 2025.**

5% Early Sign-Up Incentive:

Properly completed, original, notarized E-Form and all necessary documentation shall be submitted to and received by DPW as described in the enclosed instruction **by 3:30 p.m. on Friday, December 15, 2025.**

The incentive for each inspected vehicle will remain in effect provided the vehicle is **ready when called**. Vendors must reliably and consistently respond to calls for work from the Highway Division of the North Kingstown Department of Public Works in a timely manner throughout the winter season. If Contractor registers vehicles or equipment during the Early Sign-Up Incentive period and their vehicle or equipment is not available for the first storm, each vehicle or piece of equipment not ready will lose its incentive for the remainder of the winter season. Should there be extraordinary or extenuating circumstances, the vendor shall demonstrate this in correspondence directed to the Highway Superintendent. Decisions made by the Highway Superintendent will be final.

End of Winter Season Bonus Payment Incentive:

A bonus incentive will be paid out at the end of the winter season (after April 15) to vendors for every winter storm event that equipment is called in, responds on time, and works straight through until their release time designated by the Highway Superintendent. Incentive bonus rates are listed on the R-Form.

Contractors **must** have each vehicle, or piece of equipment to be used, inspected at the Public Works Facility located at 2050 Davisville Road prior to being called to plow. Contact the Highway Department Mechanic Shop at 268-1500, x 633 to schedule an inspection appointment. Business hours are Monday – Friday, 7:30 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. Submit all required documents and properly complete all forms. **The Town of North Kingstown will only use Contractors whose paperwork is complete and whose vehicles and equipment have passed inspection. Returning Contractors must register for the winter season and provide updated drivers information and Certificate of Insurance.**

Owner/Contractor Agreement
2025-2026

Conditions Covering Compensation:

1. Hired equipment shall be required to punch a timecard in and out at the facility reported to. Compensated time will begin only when the hired equipment is on Town time designated by the timecard. **Contractors will be paid for only the equipment or portion thereof that is utilized for any given storm. (Example: If your truck is equipped with a sander and you were not designated as a sander during the storm, you will not be compensated for the sander.)** Vendors providing end of storm clean-up equipment/services will be compensated for services required following the end of accumulating precipitation. No compensatory time is allowed for the attachment or detachment of plowing equipment, for travel, stand-by, breakdown or meals.
2. Hired equipment shall meet minimum safety standards. Safety lighting on all hired equipment must conform to requirements. The Highway Division reserves the right to refuse the use of a piece of hired equipment if it is the opinion of the supervisor that the equipment is not able to do the job. To qualify for approval, vehicle(s) shall pass a pre-season inspection with all equipment attached. Each owner shall maintain a current vehicle registration and legally ensure all vehicles/equipment as required by all RI laws and regulations. The owner shall promptly forward a copy of any new or revised registration or insurance for listed equipment to the office of the Superintendent of Highway.
3. Contractor must comply with the applicable provisions of the State Workers' Compensation Insurance. The owner agrees to accept all responsibility for liabilities incurred by the rented equipment during the term of operations to which it is assigned. The owner further agrees that the Town of North Kingstown, the Director, his agents, and employees be held harmless from any and all claims and actions whatsoever that arise from his/her operations. Independent Contractors are required to register with the RI Department of Labor and Training prior to working for the Town.
4. Contractors are required to have a cell phone in vehicle to communicate with base station as a back-up to radios issued by the Town.
5. Contractors are responsible for returning Town issued hand-held radios in operable condition; Contractor will be required to compensate Town for replacement cost of any equipment not returned in said condition.

6. All rates in this Agreement include the equipment, accessories, licensed qualified operators and operating costs, including but not limited to, insurance, registration fees, maintenance, repairs, and fuels. All equipment must arrive with fuel, in good working condition, and with all reimbursable accessories functioning properly.

Reporting to Work and Payment Processing:

1. When a contractor is called to start work, they will be offered a minimum of four (4) hours of work. **Contractors or their drivers shall “punch-in” within one (1) hour of contractor receiving the call to report.** Failure to report within one (1) hour of call-in will negate the four-hour minimum guarantee.
2. When a contractor is notified to end work, contractor will be required to immediately return to reporting facility and “punch-out” the timecard.
3. Any contractor providing sanding assistance shall, at the end of each event, return to the designated stockpile and return any loaded material. Applying excess material onto the roadway as a method of spinning off unused material is not allowed.
4. Timecards will be processed by the Highway Department and its personnel will ensure payments are based upon the approved hourly rates and bonus percentage if applicable.
5. Invoices from the vendor will not be necessary.
6. In the event the contractor’s equipment or accessory breaks down during a storm, its hourly rate will be adjusted to reflect only the working equipment and/or accessories.

Safety Requirements:

1. The Federal Highway Administration has regulations that require employers with drivers of commercial vehicles to have an alcohol and drug-testing program in place. The specific provisions of the regulations are highly detailed and legally complex. **Any truck (≥ 26,001 GVW) requiring operator to maintain a CDL will be required to comply with Federal Drug and Alcohol Testing regulations,** which are cited as 49 CFR Part 382 (<https://www.ecfr.gov/current/title-49/subtitle-B/chapter-III/subchapter-B/part-382>).
2. In the event that a contractor or operator is involved in an incident (i.e. accident, collision, etc.) while working for the Town, the operator or a representative of the contractor shall notify the Highway Superintendent immediately (in a safe manner). **All incidents** shall be reported to the North Kingstown Police Department (NKPD) so that an Accident Report may be prepared. Following the incident, the operator shall provide DPW with a copy of the accident report. Failure to notify the NKPD and DPW will result in disqualification of contractor for the remainder of the season and termination of the Agreement.

3. Operators are always reminded to wear their safety-belt and that texting while driving is prohibited. In addition, the use of a mobile phone should be limited as much as possible while operating vehicle/equipment.
4. Operators shall follow, observe, and adhere to all applicable State and Federal laws, rules and regulations.

License, Registration, and Insurance Requirements:

1. The owner is required to verify the license status of all vehicle or equipment operators and is prohibited from using unlicensed operators in the performance of this Agreement. The contractor is further obligated to report the loss, revocation, or suspension of any operator's licenses during the term of this agreement.
2. During the term of this agreement, each owner shall maintain a current vehicle registration for the specified equipment. The owner shall promptly forward a copy of any new or revised registration or insurance of listed equipment to the Highway Superintendent.
3. The contractor shall comply with all applicable provisions of the State Workers' Compensation Insurance. The contractor agrees that the Town of North Kingstown, the Director, his agents, and employees shall be held harmless from any and all claims and actions whatsoever that arise from his/her operations.
4. The contractor is responsible to ensure that all equipment listed in the Agreement is legally insured as required by all RI laws and regulations. Contractor shall be responsible for damage to private property, including but not limited to landscaping, mailboxes, windshields, etc.

The following forms shall be completed by the Contractor (Owner) and submitted to the Department:

1. The E-Form, listing equipment and accessories that are available for hire by the Town of North Kingstown, using the codes and rates found on the enclosed R-form. The Owner shall sign completed E-Form and have his/her signature notarized. The original E-form shall be submitted to DPW for its use.
2. Enclose copies of valid registration(s) for vehicles.
3. Enclose a valid **Certificate of Liability Insurance** (standard form) from your insurance company designating the Town of North Kingstown, 100 Fairway Drive, North Kingstown, R.I. as the holder and also as Additional Insured (valid through

4/30/2026). The Certificate of Insurance shall clearly show itemized coverage of commercial insurance coverage for:

- a. General Liability of at least \$1,000,000.00 (One million dollars)
 - b. Auto Liability of at least \$1,000,000.00 (One million dollars)
 - c. Worker's Compensation w/waiver of subrogation (if not registered as an Independent Contractor with RIDLT).
4. This office must be notified of any changes made involving vehicles and/or accessories and/or change of address.
 5. Submit a completed W-9 form.
 6. Submit copy of driver's license for EACH driver; trucks requiring operator to hold CDL will have to discuss Random Drug & Alcohol Testing Program inclusion.
 7. Submit registration as an Independent Contractor with RI Department of Labor and Training, if not previously registered, if required at <https://dlt.ri.gov/workers-compensation/independent-contractors>. Hiring entity is the Town of North Kingstown, 100 Fairway Drive, North Kingstown, RI 02852; FEIN #05-6000271.
 8. Completed Contractor Inspection Form.

Exceptions specified in the saving clause may permit an exemption from tax to continue for certain types of income even after the payee has otherwise become a U.S. resident alien for tax purposes.

If you are a U.S. resident alien who is relying on an exception contained in the saving clause of a tax treaty to claim an exemption from U.S. tax on certain types of income, you must attach a statement to Form W-9 that specifies the following five items.

1. The treaty country. Generally, this must be the same treaty under which you claimed exemption from tax as a nonresident alien.
2. The treaty article addressing the income.
3. The article number (or location) in the tax treaty that contains the saving clause and its exceptions.
4. The type and amount of income that qualifies for the exemption from tax.
5. Sufficient facts to justify the exemption from tax under the terms of the treaty article.

Example. Article 20 of the U.S.-China income tax treaty allows an exemption from tax for scholarship income received by a Chinese student temporarily present in the United States. Under U.S. law, this student will become a resident alien for tax purposes if their stay in the United States exceeds 5 calendar years. However, paragraph 2 of the first Protocol to the U.S.-China treaty (dated April 30, 1984) allows the provisions of Article 20 to continue to apply even after the Chinese student becomes a resident alien of the United States. A Chinese student who qualifies for this exception (under paragraph 2 of the first Protocol) and is relying on this exception to claim an exemption from tax on their scholarship or fellowship income would attach to Form W-9 a statement that includes the information described above to support that exemption.

If you are a nonresident alien or a foreign entity, give the requester the appropriate completed Form W-8 or Form 8233.

Backup Withholding

What is backup withholding? Persons making certain payments to you must under certain conditions withhold and pay to the IRS 24% of such payments. This is called “backup withholding.” Payments that may be subject to backup withholding include, but are not limited to, interest, tax-exempt interest, dividends, broker and barter exchange transactions, rents, royalties, nonemployee pay, payments made in settlement of payment card and third-party network transactions, and certain payments from fishing boat operators. Real estate transactions are not subject to backup withholding.

You will not be subject to backup withholding on payments you receive if you give the requester your correct TIN, make the proper certifications, and report all your taxable interest and dividends on your tax return.

Payments you receive will be subject to backup withholding if:

1. You do not furnish your TIN to the requester;
2. You do not certify your TIN when required (see the instructions for Part II for details);
3. The IRS tells the requester that you furnished an incorrect TIN;
4. The IRS tells you that you are subject to backup withholding because you did not report all your interest and dividends on your tax return (for reportable interest and dividends only); or
5. You do not certify to the requester that you are not subject to backup withholding, as described in item 4 under “*By signing the filled-out form*” above (for reportable interest and dividend accounts opened after 1983 only).

Certain payees and payments are exempt from backup withholding. See *Exempt payee code*, later, and the separate Instructions for the Requester of Form W-9 for more information.

See also *Establishing U.S. status for purposes of chapter 3 and chapter 4 withholding*, earlier.

What Is FATCA Reporting?

The Foreign Account Tax Compliance Act (FATCA) requires a participating foreign financial institution to report all U.S. account holders that are specified U.S. persons. Certain payees are exempt from FATCA reporting. See *Exemption from FATCA reporting code*, later, and the Instructions for the Requester of Form W-9 for more information.

Updating Your Information

You must provide updated information to any person to whom you claimed to be an exempt payee if you are no longer an exempt payee and anticipate receiving reportable payments in the future from this person. For example, you may need to provide updated information if you are a C corporation that elects to be an S corporation, or if you are no longer tax exempt. In addition, you must furnish a new Form W-9 if the name or TIN changes for the account, for example, if the grantor of a grantor trust dies.

Penalties

Failure to furnish TIN. If you fail to furnish your correct TIN to a requester, you are subject to a penalty of \$50 for each such failure unless your failure is due to reasonable cause and not to willful neglect.

Civil penalty for false information with respect to withholding. If you make a false statement with no reasonable basis that results in no backup withholding, you are subject to a \$500 penalty.

Criminal penalty for falsifying information. Willfully falsifying certifications or affirmations may subject you to criminal penalties including fines and/or imprisonment.

Misuse of TINs. If the requester discloses or uses TINs in violation of federal law, the requester may be subject to civil and criminal penalties.

Specific Instructions

Line 1

You must enter one of the following on this line; **do not** leave this line blank. The name should match the name on your tax return.

If this Form W-9 is for a joint account (other than an account maintained by a foreign financial institution (FFI)), list first, and then circle, the name of the person or entity whose number you entered in Part I of Form W-9. If you are providing Form W-9 to an FFI to document a joint account, each holder of the account that is a U.S. person must provide a Form W-9.

• **Individual.** Generally, enter the name shown on your tax return. If you have changed your last name without informing the Social Security Administration (SSA) of the name change, enter your first name, the last name as shown on your social security card, and your new last name.

Note for ITIN applicant: Enter your individual name as it was entered on your Form W-7 application, line 1a. This should also be the same as the name you entered on the Form 1040 you filed with your application.

• **Sole proprietor.** Enter your individual name as shown on your Form 1040 on line 1. Enter your business, trade, or “doing business as” (DBA) name on line 2.

• **Partnership, C corporation, S corporation, or LLC, other than a disregarded entity.** Enter the entity’s name as shown on the entity’s tax return on line 1 and any business, trade, or DBA name on line 2.

• **Other entities.** Enter your name as shown on required U.S. federal tax documents on line 1. This name should match the name shown on the charter or other legal document creating the entity. Enter any business, trade, or DBA name on line 2.

• **Disregarded entity.** In general, a business entity that has a single owner, including an LLC, and is not a corporation, is disregarded as an entity separate from its owner (a disregarded entity). See Regulations section 301.7701-2(c)(2). A disregarded entity should check the appropriate box for the tax classification of its owner. Enter the owner’s name on line 1. The name of the owner entered on line 1 should never be a disregarded entity. The name on line 1 should be the name shown on the income tax return on which the income should be reported. For

example, if a foreign LLC that is treated as a disregarded entity for U.S. federal tax purposes has a single owner that is a U.S. person, the U.S. owner’s name is required to be provided on line 1. If the direct owner of the entity is also a disregarded entity, enter the first owner that is not disregarded for federal tax purposes. Enter the disregarded entity’s name on line 2. If the owner of the disregarded entity is a foreign person, the owner must complete an appropriate Form W-8 instead of a Form W-9. This is the case even if the foreign person has a U.S. TIN.

Line 2

If you have a business name, trade name, DBA name, or disregarded entity name, enter it on line 2.

Line 3a

Check the appropriate box on line 3a for the U.S. federal tax classification of the person whose name is entered on line 1. Check only one box on line 3a.

Line 3b

Check this box if you are a partnership (including an LLC classified as a partnership for U.S. federal tax purposes), trust, or estate that has any foreign partners, owners, or beneficiaries, and you are providing this form to a partnership, trust, or estate, in which you have an ownership interest. You must check the box on line 3b if you receive a Form W-8 (or documentary evidence) from any partner, owner, or beneficiary establishing foreign status or if you receive a Form W-9 from any partner, owner, or beneficiary that has checked the box on line 3b.

Note: A partnership that provides a Form W-9 and checks box 3b may be required to complete Schedules K-2 and K-3 (Form 1065). For more information, see the Partnership Instructions for Schedules K-2 and K-3 (Form 1065).

If you are required to complete line 3b but fail to do so, you may not receive the information necessary to file a correct information return with the IRS or furnish a correct payee statement to your partners or beneficiaries. See, for example, sections 6698, 6722, and 6724 for penalties that may apply.

Line 4 Exemptions

If you are exempt from backup withholding and/or FATCA reporting, enter in the appropriate space on line 4 any code(s) that may apply to you.

Exempt payee code.

- Generally, individuals (including sole proprietors) are not exempt from backup withholding.
- Except as provided below, corporations are exempt from backup withholding for certain payments, including interest and dividends.
- Corporations are not exempt from backup withholding for payments made in settlement of payment card or third-party network transactions.
- Corporations are not exempt from backup withholding with respect to attorneys’ fees or gross proceeds paid to attorneys, and corporations that provide medical or health care services are not exempt with respect to payments reportable on Form 1099-MISC.

The following codes identify payees that are exempt from backup withholding. Enter the appropriate code in the space on line 4.

1—An organization exempt from tax under section 501(a), any IRA, or a custodial account under section 403(b)(7) if the account satisfies the requirements of section 401(f)(2).

- 2—The United States or any of its agencies or instrumentalities.
- 3—A state, the District of Columbia, a U.S. commonwealth or territory, or any of their political subdivisions or instrumentalities.
- 4—A foreign government or any of its political subdivisions, agencies, or instrumentalities.
- 5—A corporation.
- 6—A dealer in securities or commodities required to register in the United States, the District of Columbia, or a U.S. commonwealth or territory.
- 7—A futures commission merchant registered with the Commodity Futures Trading Commission.
- 8—A real estate investment trust.
- 9—An entity registered at all times during the tax year under the Investment Company Act of 1940.
- 10—A common trust fund operated by a bank under section 584(a).
- 11—A financial institution as defined under section 581.
- 12—A middleman known in the investment community as a nominee or custodian.
- 13—A trust exempt from tax under section 664 or described in section 4947.

The following chart shows types of payments that may be exempt from backup withholding. The chart applies to the exempt payees listed above, 1 through 13.

IF the payment is for . . .	THEN the payment is exempt for . . .
• Interest and dividend payments	All exempt payees except for 7.
• Broker transactions	Exempt payees 1 through 4 and 6 through 11 and all C corporations. S corporations must not enter an exempt payee code because they are exempt only for sales of noncovered securities acquired prior to 2012.
• Barter exchange transactions and patronage dividends	Exempt payees 1 through 4.
• Payments over \$600 required to be reported and direct sales over \$5,000 ¹	Generally, exempt payees 1 through 5. ²
• Payments made in settlement of payment card or third-party network transactions	Exempt payees 1 through 4.

¹ See Form 1099-MISC, Miscellaneous Information, and its instructions.

² However, the following payments made to a corporation and reportable on Form 1099-MISC are not exempt from backup withholding: medical and health care payments, attorneys' fees, gross proceeds paid to an attorney reportable under section 6045(f), and payments for services paid by a federal executive agency.

Exemption from FATCA reporting code. The following codes identify payees that are exempt from reporting under FATCA. These codes apply to persons submitting this form for accounts maintained outside of the United States by certain foreign financial institutions. Therefore, if you are only submitting this form for an account you hold in the United States, you may leave this field blank. Consult with the person requesting this form if you are uncertain if the financial institution is subject to these requirements. A requester may indicate that a code is not required by providing you with a Form W-9 with "Not Applicable" (or any similar indication) entered on the line for a FATCA exemption code.

A—An organization exempt from tax under section 501(a) or any individual retirement plan as defined in section 7701(a)(37).

B—The United States or any of its agencies or instrumentalities.

C—A state, the District of Columbia, a U.S. commonwealth or territory, or any of their political subdivisions or instrumentalities.

D—A corporation the stock of which is regularly traded on one or more established securities markets, as described in Regulations section 1.1472-1(c)(1)(i).

E—A corporation that is a member of the same expanded affiliated group as a corporation described in Regulations section 1.1472-1(c)(1)(i).

F—A dealer in securities, commodities, or derivative financial instruments (including notional principal contracts, futures, forwards, and options) that is registered as such under the laws of the United States or any state.

G—A real estate investment trust.

H—A regulated investment company as defined in section 851 or an entity registered at all times during the tax year under the Investment Company Act of 1940.

I—A common trust fund as defined in section 584(a).

J—A bank as defined in section 581.

K—A broker.

L—A trust exempt from tax under section 664 or described in section 4947(a)(1).

M—A tax-exempt trust under a section 403(b) plan or section 457(g) plan.

Note: You may wish to consult with the financial institution requesting this form to determine whether the FATCA code and/or exempt payee code should be completed.

Line 5

Enter your address (number, street, and apartment or suite number). This is where the requester of this Form W-9 will mail your information returns. If this address differs from the one the requester already has on file, enter "NEW" at the top. If a new address is provided, there is still a chance the old address will be used until the payor changes your address in their records.

Line 6

Enter your city, state, and ZIP code.

Part I. Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN)

Enter your TIN in the appropriate box. If you are a resident alien and you do not have, and are not eligible to get, an SSN, your TIN is your IRS ITIN. Enter it in the entry space for the Social security number. If you do not have an ITIN, see *How to get a TIN* below.

If you are a sole proprietor and you have an EIN, you may enter either your SSN or EIN.

If you are a single-member LLC that is disregarded as an entity separate from its owner, enter the owner's SSN (or EIN, if the owner has one). If the LLC is classified as a corporation or partnership, enter the entity's EIN.

Note: See *What Name and Number To Give the Requester*, later, for further clarification of name and TIN combinations.

How to get a TIN. If you do not have a TIN, apply for one immediately. To apply for an SSN, get Form SS-5, Application for a Social Security Card, from your local SSA office or get this form online at www.SSA.gov. You may also get this form by calling 800-772-1213. Use Form W-7, Application for IRS Individual Taxpayer Identification Number, to apply for an ITIN, or Form SS-4, Application for Employer Identification Number, to apply for an EIN. You can apply for an EIN online by accessing the IRS website at www.irs.gov/EIN. Go to www.irs.gov/Forms to view, download, or print Form W-7 and/or Form SS-4. Or, you can go to www.irs.gov/OrderForms to place an order and have Form W-7 and/or Form SS-4 mailed to you within 15 business days.

If you are asked to complete Form W-9 but do not have a TIN, apply for a TIN and enter "Applied For" in the space for the TIN, sign and date the form, and give it to the requester. For interest and dividend payments, and certain payments made with respect to readily tradable instruments, you will generally have 60 days to get a TIN and give it to the requester before you are subject to backup withholding on payments. The 60-day rule does not apply to other types of payments. You will be subject to backup withholding on all such payments until you provide your TIN to the requester.

Note: Entering "Applied For" means that you have already applied for a TIN or that you intend to apply for one soon. See also *Establishing U.S. status for purposes of chapter 3 and chapter 4 withholding*, earlier, for when you may instead be subject to withholding under chapter 3 or 4 of the Code.

Caution: A disregarded U.S. entity that has a foreign owner must use the appropriate Form W-8.

Part II. Certification

To establish to the withholding agent that you are a U.S. person, or resident alien, sign Form W-9. You may be requested to sign by the withholding agent even if item 1, 4, or 5 below indicates otherwise.

For a joint account, only the person whose TIN is shown in Part I should sign (when required). In the case of a disregarded entity, the person identified on line 1 must sign. Exempt payees, see *Exempt payee code*, earlier.

Signature requirements. Complete the certification as indicated in items 1 through 5 below.

1. Interest, dividend, and barter exchange accounts opened before 1984 and broker accounts considered active during 1983. You must give your correct TIN, but you do not have to sign the certification.

2. Interest, dividend, broker, and barter exchange accounts opened after 1983 and broker accounts considered inactive during 1983. You must sign the certification or backup withholding will apply. If you are subject to backup withholding and you are merely providing your correct TIN to the requester, you must cross out item 2 in the certification before signing the form.

3. Real estate transactions. You must sign the certification. You may cross out item 2 of the certification.

4. Other payments. You must give your correct TIN, but you do not have to sign the certification unless you have been notified that you have previously given an incorrect TIN. "Other payments" include payments made in the course of the requester's trade or business for rents, royalties, goods (other than bills for merchandise), medical and health care services (including payments to corporations), payments to a nonemployee for services, payments made in settlement of payment card and third-party network transactions, payments to certain fishing boat crew members and fishermen, and gross proceeds paid to attorneys (including payments to corporations).

5. Mortgage interest paid by you, acquisition or abandonment of secured property, cancellation of debt, qualified tuition program payments (under section 529), ABLE accounts (under section 529A), IRA, Coverdell ESA, Archer MSA or HSA contributions or distributions, and pension distributions. You must give your correct TIN, but you do not have to sign the certification.

Secure Your Tax Records From Identity Theft

Identity theft occurs when someone uses your personal information, such as your name, SSN, or other identifying information, without your permission to commit fraud or other crimes. An identity thief may use your SSN to get a job or may file a tax return using your SSN to receive a refund.

To reduce your risk:

- Protect your SSN,
- Ensure your employer is protecting your SSN, and
- Be careful when choosing a tax return preparer.

If your tax records are affected by identity theft and you receive a notice from the IRS, respond right away to the name and phone number printed on the IRS notice or letter.

If your tax records are not currently affected by identity theft but you think you are at risk due to a lost or stolen purse or wallet, questionable credit card activity, or a questionable credit report, contact the IRS Identity Theft Hotline at 800-908-4490 or submit Form 14039.

For more information, see Pub. 5027, Identity Theft Information for Taxpayers.

Victims of identity theft who are experiencing economic harm or a systemic problem, or are seeking help in resolving tax problems that have not been resolved through normal channels, may be eligible for Taxpayer Advocate Service (TAS) assistance. You can reach TAS by calling the TAS toll-free case intake line at 877-777-4778 or TTY/TDD 800-829-4059.

Protect yourself from suspicious emails or phishing schemes.

Phishing is the creation and use of email and websites designed to mimic legitimate business emails and websites. The most common act is sending an email to a user falsely claiming to be an established legitimate enterprise in an attempt to scam the user into surrendering private information that will be used for identity theft.

The IRS does not initiate contacts with taxpayers via emails. Also, the IRS does not request personal detailed information through email or ask taxpayers for the PIN numbers, passwords, or similar secret access information for their credit card, bank, or other financial accounts.

If you receive an unsolicited email claiming to be from the IRS, forward this message to phishing@irs.gov. You may also report misuse of the IRS name, logo, or other IRS property to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTA) at 800-366-4484. You can forward suspicious emails to the Federal Trade Commission at spam@uce.gov or report them at www.ftc.gov/complaint. You can contact the FTC at www.ftc.gov/idtheft or 877-IDTHEFT (877-438-4338). If you have been the victim of identity theft, see www.IdentityTheft.gov and Pub. 5027.

Go to www.irs.gov/IdentityTheft to learn more about identity theft and how to reduce your risk.

Privacy Act Notice

Section 6109 of the Internal Revenue Code requires you to provide your correct TIN to persons (including federal agencies) who are required to file information returns with the IRS to report interest, dividends, or certain other income paid to you; mortgage interest you paid; the acquisition or abandonment of secured property; the cancellation of debt; or contributions you made to an IRA, Archer MSA, or HSA. The person collecting this form uses the information on the form to file information returns with the IRS, reporting the above information. Routine uses of this information include giving it to the Department of Justice for civil and criminal litigation and to cities, states, the District of Columbia, and U.S. commonwealths and territories for use in administering their laws. The information may also be disclosed to other countries under a treaty, to federal and state agencies to enforce civil and criminal laws, or to federal law enforcement and intelligence agencies to combat terrorism. You must provide your TIN whether or not you are required to file a tax return. Under section 3406, payors must generally withhold a percentage of taxable interest, dividends, and certain other payments to a payee who does not give a TIN to the payor. Certain penalties may also apply for providing false or fraudulent information.
